What Your Child Should Know Before Kindergarten

Kindergarten is a very important part of your child's education. This is a time of developing readiness to learn and laying the foundation for a successful school experience. While one of the joys of education is that every child is different, it is helpful to recognize some of the readiness skills most kindergarteners come to school knowing. Here are some of those skills:

Language & Literacy

- I can name some letters
- I can say the sounds of some letters
- I can recite ABC/Numbers Songs & 8 or more nursery rhymes
- I know how to handle books (Orients book correctly. Front to back)
- I speak in complete sentences (4-6 words)
- I can write the letters in my first name
- I can recognize my written name

Math & Reasoning

- I can count orally to 20
- I can identify random numbers
- I can identify 4 shapes
- I can identify colors
- I can sort by color, shape & size

Social/Emotional

- I am able to take turns and function appropriately in groups
- I can focus on a task for at least 5 minutes
- I can follow 2 step directions
- I can work independently
- I take care of my own hygiene needs
- I express emotions appropriately and respect the feelings of others

Fine Motor Skills

- I can use scissors
- I can use writing tools

What are some things my child will be learning in Kindergarten?

Math

- Count objects to 25.
- Count to 100 by 1's and 10's; count backwards from 20.
- Show different ways to make 10.
- Read and write numbers to 100.
- Solve simple addition & subtraction problems using pictures, objects, or equations.
- Describe and name shapes.
- Understand the concepts: more/bigger/greater; less/smaller.

...and how you can help...

- Teach your child his/her telephone number and address.
- Have your child find objects around the house that are shaped like circles, squares, triangles, and rectangles.
- Have your child count out small quantities of familiar objects.
- As your child helps you make a favorite snack, have him or her measure some ingredients; talk about measurements.
- Take a walk through the neighborhood counting common objects such as trees, houses, and cats.
- Have your child hide something, then direct you to it using right, left, under, over, and other similar words.
- Count in sequence, leaving out numbers. See if your child can fill in the missing numbers. This also works well for the alphabet.

Reading, Writing and Communication

- Write first and last name using upper and lower case letters.
- Understand rhymes and similar-sounding words.
- Identify and write letters and their sounds.
- Recognize and write upper and lower case letters.
- Predict what will happen next in a story.
- Retell a story with the correct beginning, middle, and end.
- Understand that pictures and print represent spoken language.
- Label pictures, dictate stories, and write sentences with spaces between words.
- Know parts of a book (front, back, title; text is read left to right, etc.).
- Listen to and participate in discussions, and communicate ideas clearly and effectively.
- Read some commonly used words (Dad, Mom, I, and, the, a).
- Read simple books.
- Recognize and write sentences with ending punctuation.

...and how you can help...

- Encourage your child with your positive attitude and interactions.
- Everyday conversation builds language skills. Chat with your child about anything and everything.
- Read to and with your child 20 minutes every day. Ask questions as you read together. Talk with and listen to your child; discuss what you are reading. Include fact books (about animals, the environment, holidays, etc.).
- Read part of a story. Have your child guess what might happen next.
- Play word games with your child. Read rhymes, songs, and familiar stories.
- Encourage older siblings to read to younger siblings.
- Take your child to the library to pick out his or her own books. Talk about why he or she chose certain books.
- Encourage your children to write for different purposes (grocery lists, thank-you letters) and praise their work. Don't be too concerned with accuracy of spelling and handwriting.
- Talk to your children about their writing. Ask what they wanted to say and why they
 chose to say it that way.
- Have your child describe to you the steps for regular activities such as taking a bath or getting dressed for school.
