What are Levies for?

- Local levies are for the enrichment of programs beyond basic education
 - Music, arts, athletics, activities, student transportation, technology & tech support, nurses, counselors, etc.
- Our community <u>expects more</u> than a basic education
 - Innovative programs and options for students empower success
- Levy dollars are directed specifically to extending services/programs beyond the Statedefined allocations

The Impact of Community Support:

- Lower class sizes
- Innovative instructional programs (Advanced Placement, AVID, PLTW, etc.)
- Music and Arts programs
- Librarians
- Instructional Specialists
- Special Education programs
- Computers for students
- Curriculum adoptions

Levy Dollars Empower & Engage Students

Community Support for Academic Success



- ▶ Teachers and specialists who support classrooms for lower class size
- Curriculum adoptions on a cycle that supports learning
- ► PSAT tests, Advanced Placement classes, Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID), Project Lead the Way, Spanish Immersion, and more
- Jumpstart to Kindergarten preparedness program, paraeducator support for Kindergarten
- Professional development for teachers beyond the state allocation
- Arts and music at elementary, middle, and high school

Our Staff Empower Students to Achieve

- ▶ Staff connect with students, build relationships, support wellness, and help students find their path for success in the future.
- ► The State funds 17 counselors and we have 30 supporting student achievement
- ► The state does not fund music specialists and we have 23 to provide music instruction
- Paraeducators support academic success, including levy funded support for our littlest learners
- ► In South Kitsap, whole child support for students reaches far beyond basic education



Our Health Staff Promote Wellness

- ► The State funds 1.43 nurses. South Kitsap employs 7 nurses
- In South Kitsap, nurses support students in many ways:
 - ▶ Students with 1,035 care plans
 - ▶ 38,122 health room visits last year
 - ▶ 762 student medications managed (including seizure medications and epi-pen use/training)
 - Manage school-day care for students with many health issues including ADHD/ADD, anaphylaxis, asthma, cardiovascular, developmental conditions, diabetes, hematological, mental/behavioral, neurologic, oncological, seizures, and traumatic brain injury
 - ▶ At least 270 of these are life-threatening conditions
 - Nurses are critical to school operations during the COVID pandemic



Our Special Education Staff Empower Students who Need More Support

- Our Special Education program has been reconfigured over the past two years to be more inclusive
- ▶ 1,498 students receive Special Education services
 - ► Approximately 15% of our student body
- School Psychologists do legally required evaluations and screenings for services needed – nearly 500 screenings so far this year and over 1,000 in a typical year
- Services can include audiology, assistive technology, OT, PT, mobility, speech and language, hearing, social emotional behavioral health, and more



Technology Empowers Student Success

- We support over 13,000 Chromebook, laptop, and desktop devices for staff and students, along with over 500 printers
 - ► Five technicians to support/troubleshoot devices
- ► Levy funding supports new computers on a refresh cycle, repairs to the equipment we have, web filtering, antivirus software, spam filtering, Microsoft Office tools, etc.
- We also support and maintain the student and financial systems as well as core network for communications, safety, and internet access
- Many new devices have been added or are on order to support remote learning during the pandemic including Chromebooks, laptops, and internet access packs



Our Programs Inspire Success & Achievement Outside the Classroom



- Athletics, activities, and opportunities are crucial for student engagement
- ► At South Kitsap High School, more than 1,000 students participate in 27 different athletic teams
- ► High School students have access to more than 30 clubs to connect with their peers on common interests
- Middle School students connect with school through clubs, athletics, and activities
- Opportunities start early in South Kitsap with elementary music, choir, and strings

Background Information


The District Budget is comprised of five separate funds:

- General Fund most operating costs
- Capital Projects Fund construction and major repairs
- Associated Student Body Fund
- Transportation Vehicle Fund
- Debt Service Fund

Our local levy represents 15% of our current budget. State funding from the McCleary lawsuit has decreased the amount we collect in local levies by approximately 5.5% since 2017

Tax Year	Approx. Rate	Amount
2022	\$2.50	\$27,880,220
2023	\$2.50	\$30,386,678
2024	\$2.50	\$33,118,717
2025	\$2.50	\$36,096,640

Levy Lid by Student

- ▶ We will collect either \$2.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value or the current maximum per student, whichever is a lesser tax.
- ► For 2021, this means the tax rate is approximately \$2.49. Future years may be less.


Estimated Levy Rate Based on Per Pupil Maximum

Year	Potential Levy Rate
2022	\$2.35/thousand
2023	\$2.34/thousand
2024	\$1.91/thousand
2025	\$1.84/thousand

- These estimates are based on current best thinking but are affected by these factors:
 - Growth Rate
 - ► Consumer Price Index
 - District Enrollment

In 2020, the tax rate is \$2.50 In 2021, the tax rate is currently estimated to be \$2.49


Local Levy Rate Historically <u>Lower</u> than Voter Approval



Replacement Levy Ballot Measure

- ► On February 9, 2021, South Kitsap will have the opportunity to empower student support and success by casting their vote for the Educational Programs & Operations levy
- ► This is a **replacement** levy not a new tax
- ► The levy would be collected in calendar years 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025
- ► Tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed value will not exceed the current rate of \$2.50 and may be less over the course of the levy
